The move to the new 300 Building began earlier this month and has gone smoothly for more than 400 employees of the Energy and Environment Cabinet (EEC).

By the end of this week, nearly 700 employees will have been moved, and according to the schedule EEC should have all employees out of the Fair Oaks complex by the end of June.

“I want to commend everyone who has been intimately involved with this move,” said Department for Facilities and Support Services Commissioner Mike Burnside. “This has been a total team effort between Facilities, COT and the affected agencies—all have worked countless hours to make the transition to the new building as seamless as possible. We could also have not done this without the support of the Department of Corrections, as they have provided inmate labor to move furniture and files.”

Jacob Uhasie, with EEC’s Enforcement Division, said he likes the building and is getting used to his “new home”.

Dept. of Revenue Receives National Award

Upgrades to 30-year-old collection system

Last week the Kentucky Department of Revenue received the 2016 Outstanding Compliance Program Award from the Federation of Tax Administrators for the major upgrades made to KY OSCAR, the Division of Collection's 30-year-old legacy revenue collection system.

While working on Phase I implementation, the department was able to implement an Early Wins component which automated the Final Notice Before Seizure and Levy Process grossing \$40 million. The upgrade was complete in September 2014 and included not only the Early Win components but the following new benefits:

- ✓ Automation of many collections processes such as filing liens, issuing levies and sending out the Final Notice Before Seizure notifications).
- ✓ A self-service internet portal making it more convenient for taxpayers to make payments or set up payment agreements.
- ✓ The ability to score cases and prioritize workload to allow collectors to concentrate on cases that require employee interaction to achieve a higher likelihood of success/collection.
- ✓ Flexibility and a highly configurable workflow process allowing DOR to better manage case flow including automated correspondence.
- ✓ Improved ability to collect on behalf of other state agencies through the Enterprise Collections Programs.
